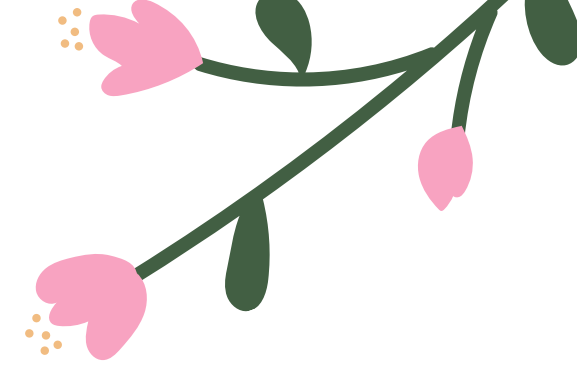

Leftover onion peels, tree bark, and even flower petals used to be key ingredients to dye eggs. Give it a try yourself by making unique onion skin-dyed Easter eggs.

The original "Easter hare" would judge kids to see if

they were naughty or nice. Yup, just like Santa Claus, the first Easter bunny was created to ensure kids were well-behaved before Easter started. Treats were only given to good kids, while those who were naughty were left with empty baskets.

The date of Easter changes every year.

You may have noticed, unlike Christmas or Halloween, Easter does not have a fixed date. It is a moveable holiday which is influenced by the moon's cycle each year. It is the first Sunday after the full Moon that occurs on or after the spring equinox. If the full Moon falls on a Sunday then Easter is the next Sunday.

Before Easter baskets children would put eggs in a hat

filled with straw. German settlers that immigrated to the U.S. in the 1700s brought a new Easter tradition. The night before Easter, children would fill their bonnets with hay, and in the morning, they would be overflowing with brightly coloured eggs.

Giving eggs

The egg symbolizes new life, fertility, and rebirth in many places around the world. Thanks to the rounded shape, it's also been used as a symbol of the earth and our connection with nature.

In the USA, there is a tradition of buying a new outfit for

Easter. It originates from an old superstition which held that wearing new clothes at Easter time meant good luck for the whole year. Christians in medieval times began wearing new, clean clothes on Easter Sunday to symbolize the resurrection of Jesus and the new life for followers of the religion.

Germans celebrate Easter with a bonfire.

The night before Easter, thousands of Germans come together to burn old Christmas trees, marking the end of winter and the beginning of spring. It's also believed that the fire will drive away evil spirits.

180 million eggs are purchased for Easter every year

Eggs are a big part of Easter celebrations. People dye, paint, hide, and eat them — not to mention the many other Easter crafts where eggs are used. All of those eggs add up to 180 million that are purchased each year for Easter.

In Hungary, young girls are soaked with water on Easter.

In Hungary, it's a tradition to soak young girls with water on Easter. This goes back to ancient times when tribes lived in Hungary. Boys throw water over girls who wear traditional clothing. It's called the "watering of the girls" and is believed to promote fertility.

Easter Island got its name from the day it was found by European explorers

European explorer, Jacob Roggeveen, discovered the southeast Pacific island, that would later be known as "Easter Island" on Easter Sunday in 1722, though the island had already been inhabited since 600-800 A.D.

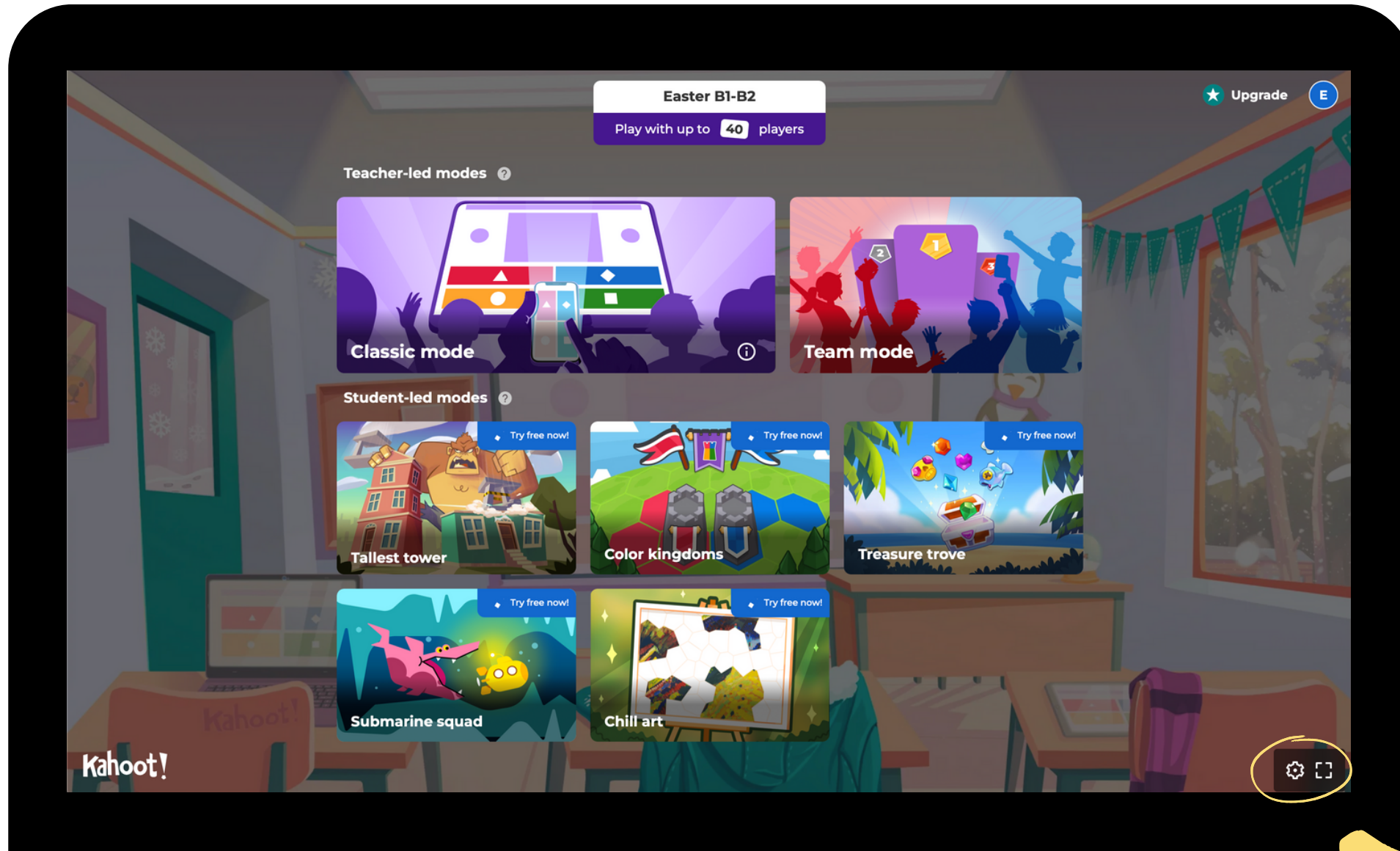
The art of decorating eggs began in Ukraine

Ukrainians should be thanked for the art of egg dyeing, which originated in ancient Ukraine and is called pysanka. Painted pysanka eggs were even believed to have powers that would bring fertility and good harvests in the new season.



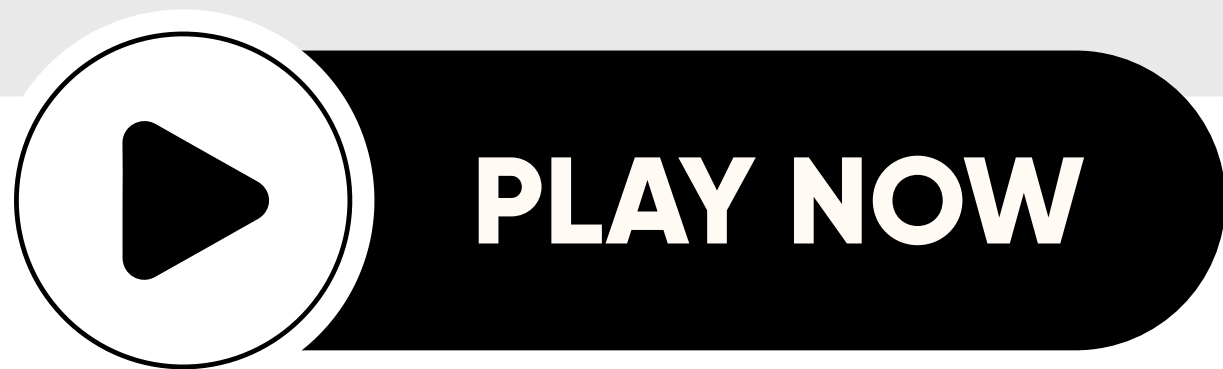


UNEXPECTED FACTS ABOUT EASTER

A person who is dishonest or untrustworthy. *She started hanging out with a few rotten eggs in her school, and her grades have really suffered ever since.*

To be embarrassed or humiliated by a mistake or failure. *This latest scandal has left the government with egg on its face.*

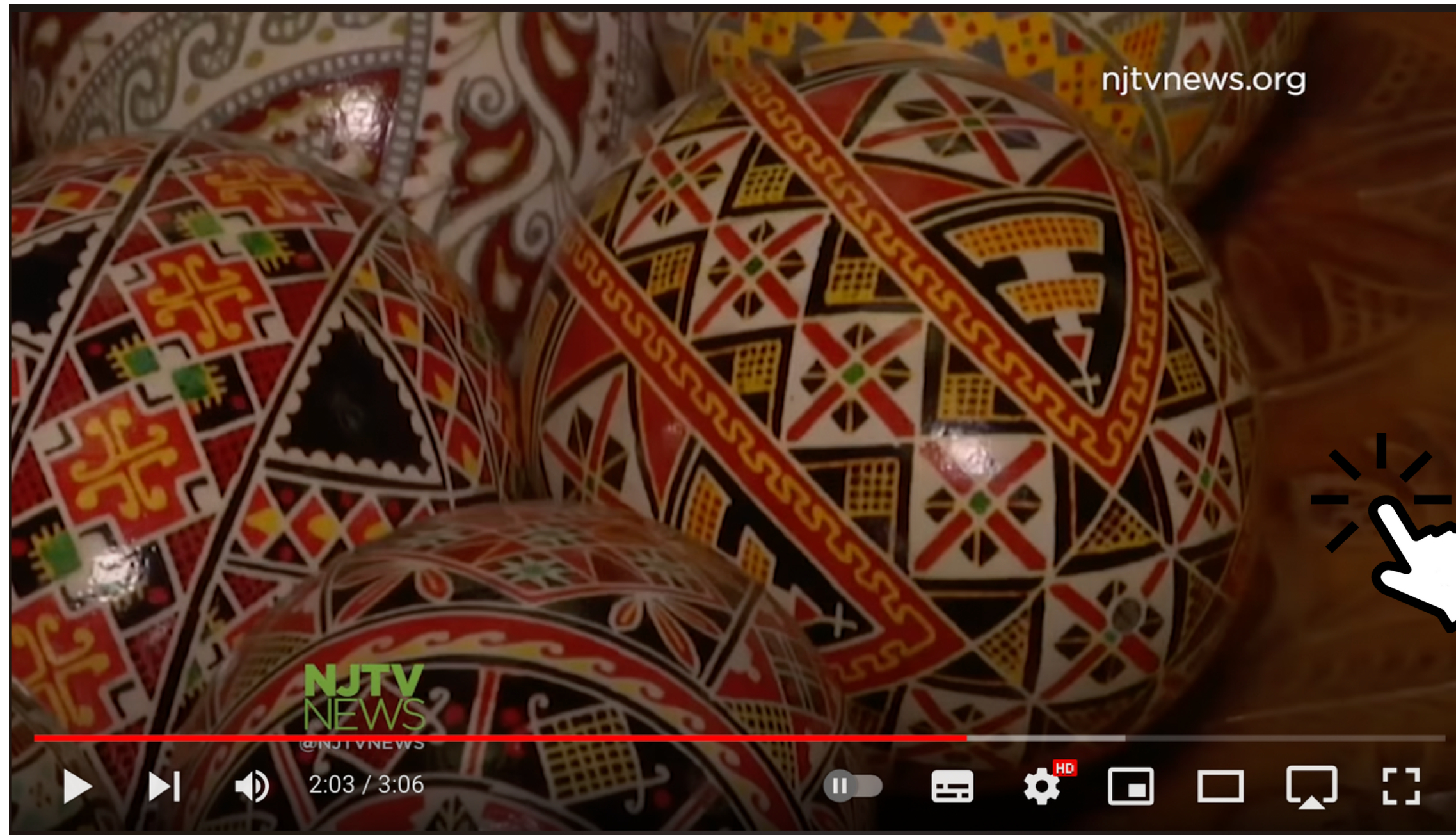

Look through the steps of making Pysanka and check if you understand the meaning of the unknown words before watching. Watch the video and number the events in the correct order.



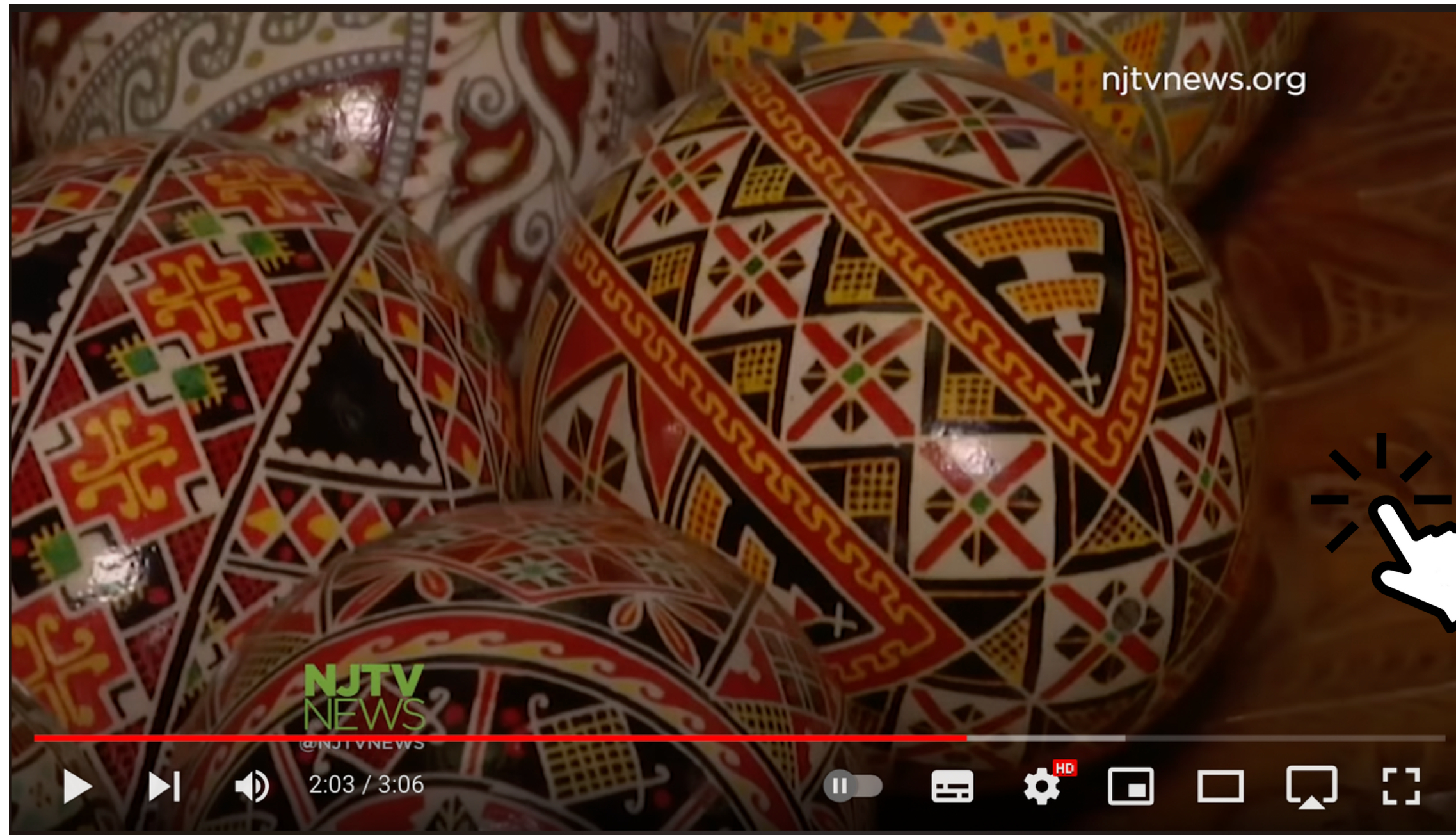
- trace all of the lines;

- gently put the egg into the dye;

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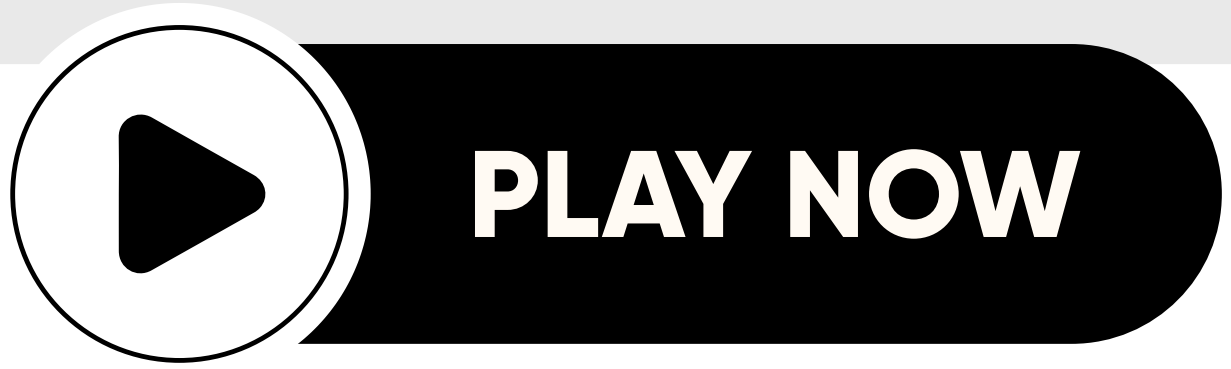
EASTER EGG HUNT
